- Reading and writing both represent spoken language and communication.


Books That Support Writing

Fun to try at home...

Trace your ABCs.

Put some flour or sand in a shallow dish and take turns writing and "erasing" the letters.

Write a letter.

Send it to a family member or friend. Your child can tell you what to say and add in drawings. This connects spoken words to writing and helps with narrative and sequencing.

Fun on the go...

Use erasable toys.

Magnetic writing toys are a fun way to practice drawing and writing on the go.

Hand tracing.

Trace a letter/shape on the back of your child's hand and see if they know what it is. Older kids can close their eyes.
