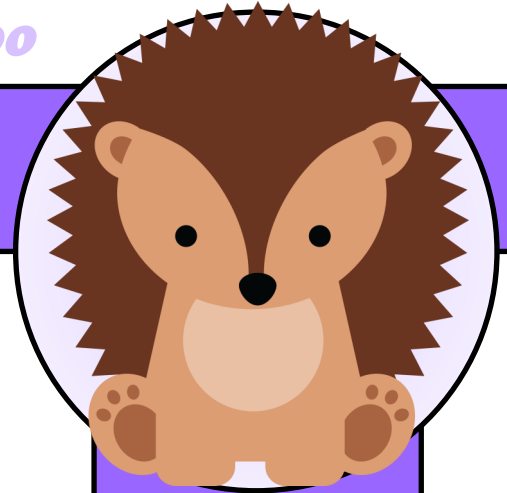

### Books That Support Talking

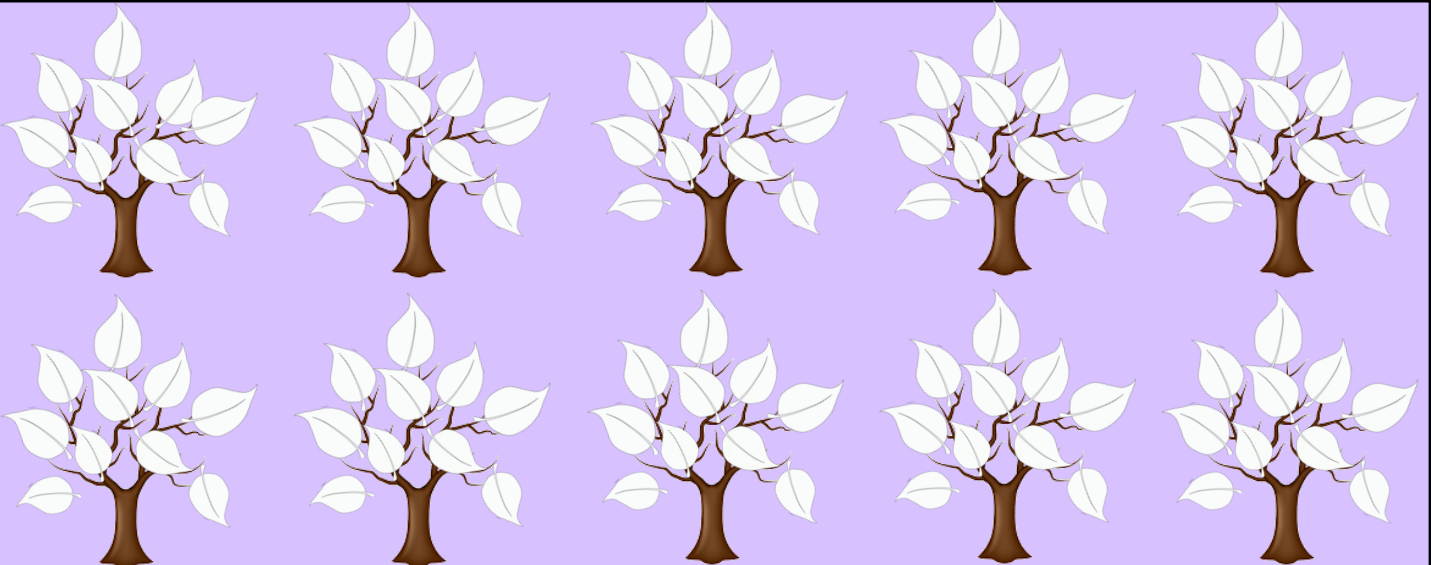
- Wordless picture books

Hedgehogs are allergic to milk.

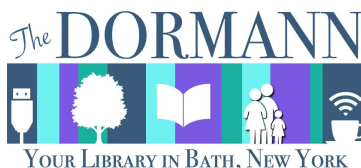

## Fun to try at home...

- **Play rhyming games.**

Start with an object and see how many words you can think of.

(Example: hat...cat...sat) Even made up words are ok.

- **Talk about food.**

Have your child help with meals when they're able to. Talk about what you're using, or doing. Identify colors, names, and tasks.

## Fun on the go...

- **Point out signs and labels when you're out.**

Talking about what different signs mean helps your child understand the words and symbols around them.

- **Play "I spy" while out and about.**

It's a fun way to develop focus and narrative skills.
